



Motoring

Having a car can be a real lifeline for a lot of people with disabilities. This factsheet explores some of the ways a disabled person can get a car, how they ensure that it is the most suitable car for them, and what rights the disabled driver has.

Financial Help

Many disabled people are on low incomes, which makes it difficult for them to afford a car, which, in turn, makes it harder for them to get the mobility a job might require. In order to break this vicious circle, there is a state funded scheme accessed through the **Mobility Component of Disabled Living Allowance** (DLA). The Mobility Component is not means tested or taxed, and should not be taken into account as income for other benefits.

Eligibility Criteria

In order to qualify for the Mobility Component you must have needed help with mobility for the previous three months, and these needs must be likely to continue for another six months. You must be normally resident, i.e. spent six out of the last twelve months in the UK, and you must be between the ages of 5 and 65. There are two different rates of the Mobility component: a higher rate and a lower rate.

For the **higher rate** you must satisfy one of the following conditions:

- Due to physical disability you are either 'unable to walk' or 'virtually unable to walk'. If you use artificial aids, your ability to walk will be judged by how you manage when using these aids. If you can walk with the use of an aid you are likely to fail the test.

- Experiencing severe discomfort or exertion which could endanger your life can be counted as 'virtually unable to walk'.
- You have no legs or feet, or both legs have been amputated by or above the ankles, you should qualify automatically. How you get along with your prostheses does not affect this.
- You have both a visual and hearing impairment, where the loss of vision is assessed at 100% and the loss of hearing at 80%.

If you have a **learning disability**, you have to show that you:

- have impaired intelligence and social functioning; and
- have severe behavioural problems; and
- qualify for the higher rate of the Care Component.

For the **lower rate** you must satisfy the following:

- You are able to walk, but because of a mental or physical disability, you require guidance or supervision from another person when you are walking outdoors

Rates:

The mobility components of DLA are paid weekly and the two rates are:

Higher - £43.45 Lower - £16.50

The Motability Scheme

Motability is a charity set up on the initiative of the government and designed to help people use their higher rate mobility component to buy or hire a car.

For the motorist there are 3 different types of scheme to choose between:

- A three year Contract Hire Scheme to lease a new car.
- A four, or five year, Hire Purchase Scheme to buy a new car.
- A two, three, four, or five year, Hire Purchase Scheme to buy a used car.

Driving Licence

Whether you are applying for a licence for the first time, or need to change your licence after you have become disabled you have to contact the Driver and Vehicle Licensing Agency (DVLA).

As a new applicant you need forms D1 and D750 (available at the post office), and if you have a current licence you must write and explain the extent of your disability.

Assessment by an assessment centre is necessary to decide what adaptations you need to enable you to drive.

The DVLA will assess your ability to drive based on a 'medical-in-confidence' form. You might be asked to attend an examination, but with all the adaptations available today, most people get their licence. For more information contact DVLA on: **0870 240 0009**

Blue Badge

The Blue badge Scheme replaces the Orange Badge and provides a national scheme of parking concessions for people with disabilities.

It allows the holder to park free of charge on metered street parking, to be exempt from time limits, and to park on single or double yellow lines for up to three hours.

All concessions are subject to local regulations and in certain town centres (e.g. central London) the scheme does not apply, although there may be local concessions.

In order to access the Motability schemes you must be receiving the higher rate of the DLA mobility component and in most cases you must be receiving your allowance for the full length of the Agreement. However, if your award is shorter than the length of the agreement you may still be eligible.

Equipment & Adaptations

Motability also administers their own Charitable Fund as well as some government grants that can help pay for adaptations or any other costs involved with getting a car.

The Charitable Fund can be granted towards:

- Advance payments on cars
- Adaptations
- Driving Lessons (the applicant must be participating in a Motability Scheme)

Choosing the Right Car

Before you go out and buy or hire a car, think carefully of your needs and what type of car might be appropriate for you. You can visit some of the dealers near where you live, look at the manufacturers' websites or literature, and talk to friends and neighbours who drive.

There are about 3,500 Motability Accredited dealers in the UK. Each has at least one Motability specialist; you can ask them to advise on which car best suits your personal circumstances.

The most important factors are safety and access. You should think about the door width and sill and boot height of the car/whether you need 2,3,4, or 5 doors, or an estate car/whether there is enough space to carry a wheelchair with you. Check the driving position

and make sure the hand and foot controls are suitable and easy to use. Think about whether you would prefer automatic or manual gears and if you would be more comfortable with air conditioning.

You are entitled to test drive any of the cars that you are considering applying for. If you are not going to be the driver of the car, you should take a test drive as a passenger.

Exemption from VED (or 'Road Tax').

In some cases, disabled drivers can be exempt from VED commonly known as 'Road Tax'.

You are entitled to an exemption if you either:

Receive the higher rate of the mobility component of the

DLA **or**

you receive the War Pensioners Mobility Supplement

Congestion Charge & Blue Badge Drivers

If you have a Blue Badge you do not need to pay the London Congestion Charge.

However you do need to register with Transport for London and make a one-off payment of £10 to cover administration. You can register up to two vehicles for the discount.
