



This factsheet covers all there is to know about information technology available for disabled people. It is divided into several sections:

- Computer Equipment - special aids to help disabled people use a computer
- Low-cost Computers - companies that enable disabled people to obtain a computer at low cost
- Advice Agencies - organisations that will assist people in using a computer
- Assessment Organisations - places that will provide an assessment to see what adaptive equipment may help a disabled person use a computer.
- Computer Based Equipment - explains equipment available to disabled people that can operate household objects like lights via a computer

Computer Equipment

There are a huge variety of adaptations to enable people to use a computer easily, especially if they have a disability.

Keyboards

There are several different types of keyboard available:

- keyboard with larger keys,
- in an ABC format rather than the traditional QWERTY format
- multicoloured keys
- intellikeys keyboards.

The intellikeys keyboard is a keyboard that can be changed to suit any need or software program. It is a large flat touchpad that is adapted by having several different designs of keyboard overlays. The type of overlay used depends upon which application you are using. Designs include a traditional keyboard, number keyboard and picture keyboard. It is also possible to design your own keyboard with the OverlayMaker program if you have a unique need as. This keyboard is particularly good for people with motor skills problems, who are visually impaired or those with a learning disability.

If you have a hand tremor it is possible to get a keyguard which goes over a

normal or big key keyboard. This enables you to press keys without pressing the ones adjacent to them.

There are also keyboards that are designed to be used with one hand only, one finger only or a mouth stick and ones designed to prevent Repetitive Strain Injury (RSI). Also available are braille stickers to put on a standard keyboard or a big key keyboard for blind or partially sighted people.

Mice

There are several types of mice available, the most well known ones being the standard mouse and the trackball. The trackball is ideal for people who have limited hand function as you can use two hands to operate it. You can also obtain an optic mouse which uses a light rather than a ball to move the pointer across the screen. A few of these mice are available in shapes designed to prevent or alleviate RSI.

There are now touchpads available for desktop computers (these are usually found on laptops) which allow you to run your finger along it to move the pointer.

There is also a new type of mouse on the market that is ideal for people who are blind or partially sighted. This mouse enables you to feel the icons on the screen when the pointer runs across them. It is called the Feedback Mouse.

Software

There are many different types of software to enable disabled people to use computers effortlessly and can also be useful for non-disabled people. The most popular ones are:

Voice Recognition Software

If you are unable to use a mouse or keyboard or just find typing difficult and slow, this software could be the solution. It enables you to operate a computer by talking to it. The latest versions allow a writing speed of up to 160 words per minute.

Text to speech reading system

This will read any text on the screen and enables

people to hear what is written or being written on the computer. This can help visually impaired people and can also allow a person to type and not have to look at the screen as they can tell if a mistake has been made by listening. Many of the programs will automatically correct typing errors or phonetic spelling mistakes. This means it is also very useful for people with dyslexia.

Screen Keyboards

These programs are useful for people who do not have the dexterity to type on the keyboard. It places a keyboard on the screen which is controlled by the mouse. All the features on the keyboard, for example the shift button, are present and in addition many offer predictive text making typing faster.

Braille Translation Software

This will convert any text in to Braille. It is not necessary to know Braille to use the program. This software is compatible with most word processors and is even able to deal with graphics.

Lifeskills

This is a range of programs that help young people or people with learning difficulties learn about everyday life. Topics can range from understanding the value of money to booking holidays.

Computer Based Equipment

Today computers are used for an enormous amount of functions and many can actually assist disabled people to control items in the home.

Environmental Control Systems

This system enables people to operate a wide range of household appliances, such as TV's, Hi-Fi's, intercoms,

Paying for Specialist Computer Based Equipment

It may be possible to obtain these systems through your local social services.

If you think you may need any specialist computer based equipment you should first ask your local social services for an assessment.

They will then send an occupational therapist to your home to assess whether any equipment will be beneficial to you.

At present there is still a 'postcode lottery' as to whether your local social services will provide you with specialist computer based equipment in your home.

VAT on Computers/ Specialist Equipment

It may be possible, when buying a computer or specialist equipment, to obtain it with no VAT added.

This is only valid if the equipment has been specifically designed for disabled people.

This could include Environmental Control Systems and the many different keyboards available.

The best way to ensure that you get all the eligible equipment zero rated is to buy from specialist companies like the ones listed throughout this factsheet.

lamps, curtains and can even open doors, via a remote control. The system can enhance the independence of disabled people and the elderly by reducing their reliance on a carer or family member. In short the system is run by a mini computer which is able to learn the different functions needed to operate any appliances. A person accesses a controller using an input switch which can be operated by hand, foot, head, arm, chin or even using a blow/suck system.
